

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

Red is the most popular colour for sarees in India's wedding scene.

Women traditionally wear various types of regional sarees, some made of silk, cotton, and block-print, embroidery and tie-dye styles. Most popular sarees include silk sarees from Banarasi, Kanjeevaram, Gajra, Pochampally, Uppada, Rayalaseema, Maheshwari, Chanderi, Mysore, Narsaraipet, and Tirupati.

Silk sarees and cotton sarees known as Paithani, Pochampally, Sambalpuri, Kanchipuram, Begumpuri, Jamdani, Tant, Mangalgiri, Gurzu, Narayanpet, Chanderi, Maheshwari, Navrang, Tissue, Ikat, Kantha and Mysore were worn for both festive and everyday attire. Tie-dye and block-print sarees from Banarasi, Lehenga, Lucknow, Bagru, Ajrakh, Sanganeri, Kota Doria, Chanderi, Begumpuri and Kanchipuram were traditionally worn during marriage seasons. Gold Zari is a popular form of traditional embroidery used on sarees for formal occasions, whereas other types of embroidery like zardosi, zillie, thread, and kutchi mirror and gemstone are also commonly used for both informal and formal occasions. Today modern fabrics like polyester, georgette and chanderi are also commonly used.
